David would also like to announce that his 400-page report on his excavations at the Roman fort at Bearsden on the Antonine Wall is now available online: <https://doi.org/10.9750/9781908332189> thanks to the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland. Since the report went online 3 weeks ago there have been over 1,000 downloads from people across the world from Europe, America and Australia.

Over on her own webpage our chair has detailed her experience of continuing to work on site as a commercial archaeologist during the lockdown. Worthy of note elsewhere, is the UK government's plans to 'take an axe' to the planning and development process which could put an end to archaeological investigation as part of the planning process. It may not sound like much but this clause in the planning process has resulted in spectacular finds such as Must Farm, The Amesbury Archer, North Berstead Warrior, numerous Roman villas and farmsteads and was partially responsible for the situation leading to the discovery of Richard III. None of these things would have been found and recorded without archaeological investigation as part of the planning process. There is currently little information available about the proposed changes, but keep an eye on the papers as the nation may be called upon to protect our heritage in the coming months.
